### Let him hear what the Spirit says to the Christians: Accept or surrender?

ow many times have you accepted Jesus as your Lord and Savior, yet nothing changed in your life? The problem isn't that you accepted Him—it's that you didn't surrender your life to Him. Whether you accept Him or reject Him doesn't really matter. Nothing will change until there is total surrender.

How can someone accept Jesus without fully surrendering and still expect to receive a new life? It's impossible to receive a new life without letting go of your old one. You can't hold on to two lives at once.

The Spirit of God can only fill those who completely and unconditionally surrender their lives to Him—not those who simply accept Him. That's why the Lord commands us to "Put on the whole armor of God" (Ephesians 6:10-18). The armor of God is the fullness of His Spirit. In the same passage, He says, "Take up the whole armor of God." To take up or put on the armor of God, you must give or surrender your life to the Lord Jesus.

The Spirit of God is the Spirit of Faith. This faith allows a person to be born of the Spirit. This



faith transforms a person's character, turning someone who may have had bad habits into a new creation, filled with the Holy Spirit.

However, this faith requires sacrifice—giving up your current life to receive the new life the Lord offers. Putting on or taking up the whole armor of God is a personal decision, one that cannot be transferred. It's an act for those who genuinely want to change their lives.



I was addicted to alcohol, and it started because I thought it was just the thing to do. Addiction was a common theme in my family, so it felt almost normal. It became an everyday thing.

When I separated from my husband, I felt this emptiness, like a void, and I turned to alcohol to fill it. That led me straight into depression, and from there, I drank even more, trying to numb myself. What started as one or two drinks a day quickly turned into almost a case of beer a day, plus a bottle of liquor. It was rough.

My mom kept telling me to come back to church. She said I needed to go, but I just wasn't ready. Then one day, I went to

church, but I was still hungover from the night before. That day, I realized something was wrong. I had an addiction, and it wasn't going to go away on its own.

After that, I started going to church regularly. I'd go on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays to pray for my family, Fridays, and Sundays. Little by little, I started seeing changes. The first thing I noticed was that I didn't really want to drink anymore. It didn't happen overnight, but soon I'd have one or two beers and think, "I don't want this anymore."

As I kept going to church, I realized I didn't need alcohol to fill the void or to run from my problems. I started facing them instead, and I left my worries at the altar. After I was set free through deliverance, I started attending church on Wednesdays to seek the Holy Spirit. I received the Holy Spirit on

a Sunday during a powerful prayer. I felt Him, I heard Him speak to me, and it changed my life completely.

My whole personality changed. I'm not the same person I used to be. I feel free. The Holy Spirit set me free from my past, and I feel like a brand-new person. I don't have anger anymore, and I don't want or need alcohol.

Coming to church makes me happy now. My husband and I are back together after almost getting divorced. We come to church as a family, and our kids are happy that we're back together. Life is so much better with God.

If it wasn't for the Holy Spirit, I wouldn't have the life I have to-day. I left the old me on the al-

ver since I was young, I was always afraid of the dark. I would hear noises, and sometimes I'd hear my name being called when I was alone. That fear never left me; once it got dark outside, I couldn't go out because I was terrified. I always felt like something was watching me, something was going to

come after me. I had constant nightmares, where I'd be chased or feel like I was going to get killed. I would even see doors opening and closing in my house, and I remember seeing shadows—like human shapes—moving on the walls and ceiling. I know I was awake. I would try to wake up my parents, but my dad would look around and say there was nothing there.

Things got worse when I played with a Ouija board. After that, my nightmares became more intense. I would see a shadowy

figure in my dreams, and somehow, I just knew it was the devil. I couldn't approach it. It was like my mind was warning me not to. I woke up terrified, and more often, I would hear my name being called, even in broad daylight. I could be anywhere outside, inside—and I'd hear, "Monica," but no one would be there.

One day, my sister invited me to church. She didn't say much about it, but I always turned her down. I'd tell her, "We're Catholic, we don't need to go to another church." But the truth was, we barely went to church—only for special occasions. Then I found out my husband had been watching a church program on TV at midnight. He told me about it, and finally, I agreed to watch. After a while, we decided to go because we were struggling financially and needed help.

The first time we went to church, I felt so good after the service. I felt light and relieved. They invited us to come back on Wednesdays and Fridays. When I found out that Fridays were for people with spir-



itual problems, I knew I needed to keep going. I spoke to the assistants, and one of them challenged me to come for seven Fridays and see if I noticed any changes. If I didn't, I didn't have to come back. I accepted the challenge.

For seven Fridays, I went to church and did the prayers. I started noticing a difference. I felt different. So I decided to do another seven Fridays, and then another. It went from seven Fridays to me being at church for almost 20 years now. My life has completely changed.



Today, I don't hear voices or my name being called anymore. I don't have nightmares of being chased or feeling like I'm in danger. I feel safe and at peace. Spiritually, I know I have God with me. The Holy Spirit has transformed my life. My love life is blessed—I finally

got married after years of being in an onand-off relationship. I have three wonderful children, and financially, God has blessed us. My husband has his own business, and I recently started mine, too.

For me, the Holy Spirit means a new beginning. Before, I was a completely different person, but now I have peace and love in my heart. The Holy Spirit gave me a new life—a life of happiness, guidance, and security.

years and was deployed to ▲ Afghanistan three times as an infantryman. On November 9, 2007, around 3:30 in the afternoon, we got ambushed from six different positions. It was chaos, and I lost friends that day. That large-scale assault took place in one of the most violent regions of the country, and it really distorted my mind. I wasn't thinking clearly. I lost my sense of self-preservation—I didn't care if I lived or died. I volunteered for every mission that came our way. I just wanted to make them suffer for what they did.

When I came back, I carried a lot of injuries with me, both physical and emotional. I was diagnosed with PTSD, and I started drinking heavily—really badly. I also got into cocaine. At the time, I had two kids and a baby on the way. My kids were terrified of me. I'd wake up high and stay that way all day long. I did things I'm not proud of, and I wasn't faithful to my wife.

For years, my mom kept telling me to come meet God and talk to Him. She said that He could remove the pain in my heart. I remember the first time I went to church; it was a Wednesday. I sat in the back, and from the start to the end of

At first, I would only come on Wednesdays and Fridays, but then my mom began teaching me about the different days and their meanings. She explained that Mondays were for one thing, Tuesdays for another, and so on. I decided to start with Wednesdays because I felt a weight lifting off my shoulders. I began to smile again, and for the first time, I felt hope that I could change.

The day I received the Holy Spirit inside the church was transformative. I asked Him to come into my heart and open myself to true peace and love. I wanted to become a person





who could show love to my family and be completely different. I knew He was the only one who could help me. I had tried to do it all alone for so long, and I just couldn't.

When I finally opened my heart to Him, it was the best decision I've ever made. The feeling was wonderful. Now, my kids jump on me and tell me they love me. It's an incredible change. I have this peace in my heart, and no matter what happens, I trust that I am taken care of.

In the past, I used to get really depressed, especially on anniversaries when I lost my friends. I'd shut myself in my room and shut down completely. But now, it doesn't bother me like it used to. I understand what happened, and I give God thanks for bringing me out of that darkness. Now, I know His plan for me is to help other veterans.

To all my fellow veterans, don't let your past define who you are. There's something more for us out there,

t the age of 13, I was raped. At 14, I was molested by my uncle. I had La whole lot of traumas in my early age. I realized from my rape at 13, I wasn't able to sleep. I have endured many traumas throughout my life, a journey that spanned over 20 years. I was so traumatized that every time I lay my head on the pillow, I would wake up from my dreams, as if the triggers and trauma were repeating themselves. I was always tired and exhausted because I couldn't get sufficient sleep. My trauma and past left me with no escape, no refuge.

In my early 20s, I turned to marijuana, thinking it was my safe haven. It provided temporary comfort and helped me try to sleep, but I quickly realized it was very addictive. I found myself unable to sleep without it. There were times I felt like I was screaming inside, yet no one could hear me. I was bottled up in fear—fear of sleep, fear of facing my trauma. It became so overwhelming that I lost my sense of purpose. I started self-harming, wanting to end the pain

and darkness.

one Friday night, I decided to go to church for a night of deliverance. To be honest, I didn't want to go; I was suffering from a migraine and

felt weary. But I remember leaving that night medication or struggled with addiction, feeling grateful. My headache disappeared, understand that these are not true solutions. and I realized the devil tried to steal that I am living proof that God can make a way. night away from me, but he didn't succeed. I experienced deliverance and went home feeling a profound sense of peace. I can remember that night like it was yesterday.

Since I came to this church in October of last year, I haven't missed a Sunday. I attended financial night on Mondays, healing night on Tuesdays, Bible study on Wednesdays,



love therapy on Thursdays, and, of course, deliverance on Fridays. Coming to this church has opened my eyes spiritually and brought me a deep sense of peace. I found God, and He blessed me with that peace.

There's no turning back for me now. I've never felt this at peace or this happy before. I go to bed without medication, without marijuana—just a word of prayer, and I'm out. That's the grace of God, and I'm truly grateful.

I understand what it's like to lie awake, haunted by your thoughts—whether it's

triggers from the past, pain, heartbreak, your own inner battles. It's time to take a leap of faith. Trust in the word of God. Make that commitment and sacrifice. Invite Him into your life, knowing that He can fix what feels broken.

### "My journey from darkness to light"

My name is William, and I'm 42 years old. When I was just 11, I left home and got involved in the world of drug trafficking. Being so young, I followed the lead of others, doing whatever they asked, and I found myself getting deeper into a life of crime. In addition to dealing drugs, I began committing robberies and assaults, which eventually led to multiple incarcerations.



But despite everything, I felt empty inside—a deep sadness consumed me. I suffered from insomnia and couldn't sleep anymore. I felt so unsafe that I started carrying guns everywhere, even sleeping with them at the four corners of my bed, afraid someone would break in and kill me. My unhappiness spilled over into my relationships,



and I caused others to feel the same. I'd pick fights with people whenever I could, which only created more enemies. My life was falling apart, becoming a disgrace. I went through three failed marriages I took what I heard seriously. One Wednesday

and had no faith in anything or anyone—not even God. For me, money became my "god." Dark thoughts of death and violence filled my mind. In



one terrifying moment, a group of men broke into my house to kill me. I remember thinking, "God, please save me." Miraculously, they fled without harming me.

That day, I went straight to the bathroom, dropped to my knees, and thanked God. It was a Sunday, and I decided to get ready and go to church. From that moment on, my journey with God began. I attended services faithfully, and one Wednesday night, I heard the message: "If you are not born of water and the Spirit, you cannot enter the



kingdom of Heaven." It hit me hard. I thought, "I need to meet God."

night, I sat in the front row, determined to receive the Holy Spirit—and that night, I did. The joy was overwhelming. My life began to change. The bad habits started to fall away, my thoughts shifted, and the anger I once had was replaced with love for others. I even sought forgiveness from those I

### Vision and Behavior

The human brain primarily operates And their behavior follows that belief. through vision—whether it's what your eyes see, what your mind remembers, or what your imagination envisions.

Give your brain an image, and it will use all its power to pursue it. For example, when your stomach signals that it's hungry, your brain brings up images of the food you want or what's available.

You then begin searching for that food, preparing it, eating it, and finally, your hunger subsides.

Without the images stored in your mind the database of all the food you've seen and tasted—you wouldn't know how to satisfy your hunger. This also explains why you don't crave food you've never seen.

This is how faith works; it follows a similar process. Faith "sees" what it desires through the eyes of imagination, fueled by the Word of God.

Whether it's a cure for cancer, debt paid in full, forgiveness from sins, a transformed life, or freedom, faith begins with a vision.

Once this vision of faith is planted in the mind, the person unites their strength to bring it to life. Prayer, boldness, sacrifice, behavior changes—all of this is driven by the power of that vision.

For example, the cancer patient begins to declare that they're healed. The incarcerated person starts to believe they'll be home soon.

They no longer see themselves trapped in chemotherapy or prison; through the eyes of faith, they envision a clean medical report or a productive life outside prison walls.

The person in debt begins to see themselves debt-free. They take steps to pay it off, practice financial discipline, negotiate with creditors, give their tithes, and test God's promises. Eventually, the vision turns into reality.

Everything in life first requires a vision before a solution can come. When your vision changes, your behavior naturally follows because vision dictates your actions.

So, where have you been looking with your physical eyes? What have you been recalling through your memory? And how are you using your imagination?
