For 30 years, my New Year's celebrations were marked by addiction, arguments, and deep sadness. Every year, I'd wear white, jump over seven waves, eat pomegranate seeds, and put them in my wallet, hoping for prosperity. I'd ask for peace and happiness in my love life. But none of it ever worked. Year after year, I'd do my part in these rituals, but my life remained the same—one failure after another.

We would gather as a family to celebrate. I come from a relatively large family, and every year we'd have our get-togethers, filled with drinks and festivities. But peace in these reunions only lasted until the alcohol wore off. At midnight, we'd hug and forgive each other, but minutes into the new year, the arguments and fights would start all over again.

I was already in my second relationship, and so was my wife. It felt like a curse we couldn't escape. None of those rituals—whether

jumping waves, wearing white, or carrying pomegranate seeds—could fill the emptiness inside.

One day, while at my mother's house, a neighbor who knew our struggles approached us. She was aware of the arguments, the fights, and the destructive cycle we were trapped in. She said to us, "There's a place I know where your life can change. If you go there, I'm sure your story will be different. Those fights, those addictions, that curse—it will all end."

Curious and desperate for a solution, we decided to go. From the moment my wife stepped into that church, she said, "I feel something different here. This is where we need to be." That was the moment everything started to change.

God began to transform our lives. He freed us from addiction, ended the fights, and took away the anxiety that used to consume me. Slowly but surely, God removed all the negativity that had been weighing us down. We finally realized that the solution wasn't in rituals or superstitions. It wasn't in jumping waves, wearing white, or carrying pomegranate seeds. It was in the presence of God.

Then we heard about the church's New Year's vigil. People

told us, "If God has already done so much in your life, imagine what He can do if you dedicate the first moments of the new year to Him." So, we decided to give it a chance.

So, we decided to give it a chance.

That night was a turning point. For the first time, we spent New Year's in the presence of God. We consecrated the new year to Him and committed our lives to His guidance. And what a difference it made! There were no arguments, no drinking, no tension. Everything was peaceful. That's when I realized that God's presence could fulfill the longing I had been searching for in all the wrong places.

for many years, I spent New Year's Eve following superstitions. My family served spirits, so we had rituals: wearing different-colored underwear to attract wealth or improve relationships. I believed that wearing white would bring me peace. But every year, nothing changed. December 31st would come and go, and by January 1st, I was still the same—sad, restless, and conflicted.

I tried wearing yellow for wealth, hoping for a life of luxury and abundance, but again, nothing happened. Year after year, I remained stuck in the same cycle.

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


I WAS ADDICTED TO CLUBBING



At the end of each year, I'd get anxious. I'd look back at my plans-whether they were about my finances or my relationships and feel disappointed because nothing had turned out the way I wanted. I became obsessed with vear-end traditions, thinking they might change something. I'd carefully plan what to wear on New Year's Eve-white for peace or yellow for money—and I'd jump into the new year on my right foot, hoping for good luck. I even worried about who I'd spend the evening with because I believed those people needed to stay in my life throughout the year.

When the clock struck midnight, there was always a burst of excitement. Everyone around me believed, "This year will be different!" But deep down, I wasn't convinced. I'd already been let down so many times that I

and I'm a real estate entrepreneur. Before I found God, my New Year's celebrations were completely disastrous. I thought I could find peace in alcohol, but it only brought chaos. I even destroyed a relationship because of the way I acted during those New Year's Eve crises. I'd go out with no plan, no curfew, and no communication with anyone. One year, I just took off to Paraná without telling my family. My focus was drinking—and fighting.

The fights were ridiculous, especially with my siblings. There are four of us: three brothers and one sister. One year, things got so bad that my middle brother grabbed a broomstick to hit me. My sister tried to break it up and ended up with a scar on her leg. That scar was meant for my head. Every New Year's, the same thing would happen—arguments, negativity, anger, and hatred filled our home. I thought drinking would make me happy, but it only made things worse.

y name is Kleber Kennedy, sadness and despair, and I had no goals or plans to improve my life. One year, I got into a car accident while driving drunk, completely out of control. I was drowning in depression, debt, and meaningless relationships. My life was a mess, and I kept starting each year in the worst way possible. My addictions to alcohol and promiscuity were consuming me.

> In October 2018, I hit rock bottom after a suicide attempt. That's when a pastor approached me at a local shopping mall and invited me to church. I was going through such a dark time that I decided to give it a try. A few months later, New Year's was approaching again. After years of trying everything else, I told my girlfriend—who is now my wife that we should do something different. I suggested we spend New Year's at church. Her family, much like mine, had a tradition of hosting parties filled with alcohol, but this time, we chose a different path.

Have you ever paused to wonder what it truly means to have a relationship with God? To experience His presence, not as a distant force, but as someone deeply involved in every part of your life? Think about how you'd feel insidepeaceful, confident, and guided. Picture the help He would provide, like a loving Father who knows exactly what you need and works through people around you, such as a bishop, pastor, or mentor, to show you the way.

These spiritual leaders might teach you how to study the Word of God, how to pray, and—most importantly—how to use faith in an intelligent and practical way. Faith isn't just wishful thinking; it's a purposeful, confident trust in God, built on understanding His promises and His will for your life.

Often, God places someone in your path to walk with you as you begin this journey of faith. It could be an assistant, a pastor, or even a fellow believer who takes the time to teach you the basics—how to pray, how to believe, and how to make God the center of your life. They may guide you through the struggles and victories of faith, encouraging you to keep going even when it feels hard. These lessons become so deeply rooted in you that they shape your everyday life, influencing your decisions, relationships, and purpose.

It's natural to feel a strong sense of respect and gratitude for the person who helped you during those early stages of your spiritual growth. Maybe they were patient when you didn't understand or compassionate when you doubted. Their influence might have been pivotal, and their example inspiring. But here's a truth we must not overlook: no matter how much someone helps us, they're still human. Humans are imperfect. They have flaws and weaknesses, just like we do. The Bible speaks directly to this in 1 Peter

2:25: "For you were like sheep going astray, but now you have returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls."

This verse is a reminder to shift our focus to the true Shepherd of our souls—Jesus Christ. He is the one who truly guides us, sustains us, and transforms us from within. While it's true that God works through people, those individuals are only instruments in His hands. The work of salvation, the regeneration of your heart, and the renewal of your mind are all done by the Holy Spirit. No pastor, assistant, or mentor can claim that credit. They will make mistakes, and at some point, they may let us down-not because they want to, but because they're just like us: imperfect. That's why we must always keep our eyes on Jesus, the only one who is perfect and unchanging. Sadly, many people have stumbled in their faith or even fallen away from God because they were hurt or disappointed by someone they looked up to. They focused so much on the lordan person that when that person failed, their faith faltered too. This is why it's crucial to understand that our faith must be anchored in Jesus, not in any human being.

Remember the story of Peter walking on water? As long as he kept his eyes on Jesus, he stayed above the waves. But the moment he focused on the storm around him, he episode for you. began to sink. The same principle applies to our spiritual lives. When we take our eyes off Jesus and fixate on people, circumstances, or our own strength, we risk falling. But There is something for everyone! Do when we keep our eyes on Him, He lifts us above the waves.

So, what should we do when we see flaws in those who family, sexual orientation, curses, once guided us? First, remember that we are all a work in progress. Think of the many times you've needed God's mercy, patience, and forgiveness. Extend that same grace to others. Instead of becoming bitter or critical, pray for them. Ask God to strengthen them, heal their weaknesses, and continue using them for His glory.

Our journey of faith is personal, but it's also communal. God places people in our lives to help us grow, but He also calls us to rely on Him as our ultimate guide. When we put Jesus at the center of our lives, we build a faith that is unshakable—a faith that can weather any storm, disappointment, or challenge. And remember, the only one worthy of our unwavering trust, devotion, and admiration is Jesus Christ. He is the Shepherd and Bishop of our souls, and He will never fail us.

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
