"She was dead for 11 minutes"

On Tuesday, July 8, 2025, Evanilda, a 69-year-old retiree, went to the hospital for an echocardiogram at her cardiologist's request. It was supposed to be a simple test, just a few minutes long, but it ended in a completely unexpected way. "After the exam, I walked over to my husband and told him I was tired and thirsty. He immediately offered to get me some water. I took just two small sips, then went to the restroom. From that point on, I don't remember anything else," Evanilda recalls.

had suffered an acute myocardial infarction, better known as a heart attack, followed by cardiac arrest. "She was dead for 11 minutes," her husband Guerino said, summing up the terrifying episode that had doctors and nurses racing to revive her. Evanilda was intubated, and her life hung by a thread.

The risk of lasting complications, such as motor impairment or lifelong dependence on medication, was very real. "That same night, I went to church for the healing service," Guerino says. After three days in a coma, Evanilda opened her eyes. She spent a total of 15 days in the hospital. Fully conscious and alert, she stunned the medical team and, against all odds, walked out of the hospital with her speech, mobility, and memory intact. "The doctors said I was born again because I went 11 minutes without breathing, and even though I could have had serious aftereffects, I didn't have any," she says.



From the streets to a blessed home

ames Rodrigo, 36, recalls how his life sank into despair a few years ago. His child-hood was marked by constant arguments between his parents. "My father was very strict, but he drank, and that caused fights with my mother. I wanted to do something, but I couldn't. I promised myself I would never drink," he remembers.

But at 15, he broke the promise he had made to himself. "I started smoking and drinking. I remember leaving work just to drink on the way home so I could sleep and avoid hearing the fights. I wanted to escape the situation," he says.

Soon, drinking was no longer enough, and James turned to drugs. At that time, he was working in a restaurant, but his addiction made his relationship with his family unbearable.

"I would steal from friends and family to buy drugs, and my father would beat me. I eventually left home and moved into a small room at the back of the restaurant, but a year later I was fired and had to leave," he recalls.

While still working, he began a relationship with pastry assistant Jaqueline, 37.



After James was evicted, they decided to rent a house together.

"Over three years, we moved from one rental house to another because we couldn't afford the rent. I was drunk and high all the time. I made people smile, but inside, I was sad. In the last house we were evicted from, I even traded the light bulbs for drugs. I also traded the furniture my wife had bought with great sacrifice for crack and cocaine," he admits.

When their daughter was only three months old, James ended up living on the streets. "I became a wanderer. I would sleep during the day and walk at night. I was beaten up often because, when I was high, I would steal," he says.

He remained homeless for about a year until he ran into an old acquaintance who offered him a job at a park-

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ing lot. But once again, he stole to support his habit and quickly lost the job. "I was a liar and a deceiver, and I thought I was clever because of it. I even sold food from home to buy drugs. I told sad stories to get money from people, but they were all lies. For crack and cocaine, I stole and robbed. Drugs took everything from me," he confesses.

One day, wandering aimlessly through the streets, James walked into a Universal Church. "There, I was helped by the Angels of the Night project, and I left feeling different and hopeful. I no longer wanted to live on the streets and sought shelter. After attending the Universal Church for a short time and following the guidance of the man of God, I became completely free from drugs. My character was transformed, and I decided to rebuild my family," he says.

With James's life turning around, Jaqueline gave him another chance. "I didn't for-give him right away, but I saw the great change in him. I started attending the Universal Church because of his testimony. We got married, and now we have a new, blessed life," she says.

Today, the family is fully restored. James has asked his parents for forgiveness and has rebuilt a good relationship with them. "I am happy and at peace despite life's struggles. I am grateful to God for everything He has done in our lives. My strength comes from above, and that is the guarantee that the past is behind me," James concludes.

Diagnosed with depression, anxiety, and kleptomania, Ana hid the pain and shame she carried inside.

"To ease the pain I felt, I tried mild drugs like grass, hashish, pollen, and acorns, all in an attempt to cope with my anxiety. Then I began stealing and was diagnosed with kleptomania. I felt ashamed to reveal my diagnoses, especially kleptomania, because theft is a crime. But it is important to show that health professionals can also have mental health problems, just like me. I even remember when I went to do an internship at a psychiatric hospital. On the morning I arrived, the director of the service had committed suicide. That showed me that even health professionals often feel trapped. Nobody knows what we feel or what is inside us."

"No one around me knew what was happening to me. I was outgoing, went out, danced, drank, and was a good student. My performance never declined, so to others, I looked like I was at my best. But when I

was alone in my room, I felt a deep emptiness inside my soul. Nothing in my life should have caused depression, yet I was depressed and no medication helped me."

The solution

"Although my mother already knew the Universal Church, I was always very prejudiced and proud. At that time, I was doing an internship in psychiatry and I was a health professional, so why would I seek help in a church? For me, everyone at the Universal Church was a thief or a fanatic. It was only when I hit rock bottom that things changed. One day I was standing on a balcony thinking that if I threw myself off, all my problems would end. At that moment, I had the thought to call my mother. When I told her my life had no meaning, she was shocked. She invited me to come home for dinner, and that was when she took me to the nearest Universal Church. After the first prayer, I immediately felt better. All my anxiety disappeared. I began to feel aversion to everything I had been doing, and the emptiness of depression was filled. I surrendered myself to God because I urgently needed the Holy Spirit.

Today, I am a transformed person because God has set me free. I have the greatest treasure in life: the Holy Spirit. It was not medicine that cured me. I only found the solution in the Universal Church through Jesus!"

There are moments in life when it feels like everything has come to an end. No one is immune to hardships, whether it is a loss, betrayal, shattered dreams, or an unexpected illness. These painful experiences can feel unbearable. In times of suffering, it is common to believe there is no way out and that all that is left is to accept what remains of life.

Many people live trapped in their past, paralyzed by pain, as if that painful moment were the final page of their story. But here is the good news: with Jesus, what seemed like the end can actually become the beginning of a new life.

He does not erase the past, but He gives it new meaning. The pain that once crushed you becomes the very place where God brings healing and purpose. The trauma that used to wound you begins to tell a new story, one of faith and overcoming. Little by little, the pain stops defining who you are.

On the cross, Jesus faced the deepest suffering physically and emotionally, to the point where His sweat fell like drops of blood (Luke 22:44). Yet it was there that He defeated death and opened the way for all who believe in Him to start over and, in eternity, receive everlasting life. In other words, He redefined pain. When the Savior gave His life on the cross, His disciples surely thought everything was over, that it was the end. But on the third day, the resurrection proved that the greatest symbol of suffering had become the greatest symbol of salvation.

A new chapter

Faith in Jesus does not mean a life without pain. But it does guarantee His presence: "I am with you always" (Matthew 28:20). And His presence changes everything. With Him, what used to hurt no longer hurts, like a scar on the skin. You remember the pain, but you no longer feel it. What once destroyed now builds. What was

What once destroyed now builds. What was broken now becomes whole. You do not have to stay chained to what hurt you. In Jesus, your story does not end in pain: "Behold, I make all things new" (Revelation 21:5).

Now it is your turn

Just as in biblical times, today you can choose to look at your pain with new eyes and ask God: "Lord, what do You want to teach me through this?" Make your obstacles steppingstones that draw you closer to Him. Cry out, strengthen your faith, and remember that giving new meaning to your pain is an act of courage and faith. It means choosing not to be defined by what happened, but by what God can do through it. If you are going through deep pain right now, do not give up. You may not yet understand the purpose behind it, but trust that God is writing a new chapter. In time, you will see that what seemed like the end was actually the beginning of a new story.

But for that to happen, you need to do your part. As the apostle Paul reminds us: "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him" (Romans 8:28), even through pain. ristiane remembers when her godmother took her parents to a spiritist center. "She always told me that when she died, she would leave me an inheritance. As a child, I thought it would be her house. I never imagined it would be the demons she served. When I found out, I became afraid and started avoiding her."

Cristiane was 12 when her parents abandoned that religion. At the time, her father's alcoholism and the family's poverty contributed to their struggles, so they sought help at the Universal Church. "By attending meetings and making resolutions of faith, my father was freed from his addictions, and our life became more blessed," she recalls. Still, she admits she never truly committed to the church, and at 16 she stopped attending altogether.

Hell and the Altar

At 17, Cristiane learned of her godmother's death. From that day on, her life turned into turmoil. "I started hearing spirits speaking to me. I began drinking almost every day, lying to my parents, and skipping school to go to clubs. I embodied several demons. I had no control."

She explains that spirits often manifested when she was out on the streets. Friends or acquaintances had to carry her home, where her parents prayed for her. "I would pass out, and when I came to, I didn't even know who I was. I felt like a wanderer. I was going crazy, and my suffering grew worse every day." One day,

even without drinking, she fell ill at home and was rushed to the hospital. "I was unconscious, and the doctors declared me dead. My father entered the room where my body was covered with a sheet. I could hear everything but couldn't move. My father prayed, and at that moment, I was able to move again. The devil told me I was his and that he would kill me."

Cristiane says she lived without peace, burdened by sadness and resentment. "I mainly resented my parents for offering me to the spirits. My mind was tormented by voices. To feel happy, I drank heavily, but once the alcohol wore off, the sadness returned. I couldn't sleep properly, and at times, spirits would even abuse me. I couldn't move or make a sound. I was desperate."

Even in this state, she tried to pursue relationships but faced frustration after frustration. Though she resisted seeking spiritual help, her parents persevered in prayer for her. Finally, one Sunday morning, after repeatedly refusing invitations to return to the Universal Church, she decided to go back.

"My deliverance was a spiritual battle," she shares. "I was often still controlled by legions of demons. I also struggled with pride and shame. But when I surrendered in faith, seeking deliverance and breaking the evil inheritance, I went up to the Altar one way and came down another, feeling light. At that moment, I was sure I was free."

Cristiane understood that it wasn't enough to cast out evil spirits. She needed the Holy Spirit to dwell in her and protect her from them. The first sign of change came when she began experiencing peace and joy. Her troubles ceased, her failing relationship was restored into a solid marriage, and today she and her husband serve together in the Soul Winners group at church.

the Thankfully, worst didn't happen. Days later, a couple evangelizing outside her home invited Alexandra to attend the Universal Church. "My first thought was:

Universal Church? Really? Couldn't they invite me to another church?" she admits. Yet, the invitation stayed in her mind, and eventually, she decided to go. Still, she was so unsure that she hid behind a column the entire service.

For two years, Alexandra believed her husband was the one who needed to change. But nothing improved until she realized the transformation had to begin with her. "I never stopped praying for him or acting on my faith, but I understood that I needed to focus on myself first," she says.



From persecutor to transformed man

During that time, Alexandra often invited Serra to church, but he always refused. "She would evangelize me and even hand me the Universal News, but I would just shake it in the yard and tear it up," Serra recalls.

Everything changed when Alexandra asked him to record a special consecration at the church. Serra agreed—only because he planned to sell the footage. But that day, he

> was caught off guard. "I realized the Word of God was really being preached there."

> After attending services for three months, Serra felt a powerful change within himself. "I went to a meeting that felt like it was just for me. I decided to get baptized. I used to do drugs because I liked it, but that day, I started feeling disgusted by it. The cravings came, but for the first time in almost 17 years, I wanted to be free," he says.

Today, Alexandra and Serra are happily married and raising their children in a loving, stable home. "Our house is like an extension of the church—a little piece of heaven," they say. Sharing their story and serving God together has become their greatest joy.


In church, I laid all my anger, grudges,

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












marijuana, cocaine, and crack—anything that promised to make me forget reality," he says. After two years of crime and addiction, Luciano hit rock bottom. One night, he used drugs heavily, intending not to wake up. When he returned home, he learned that his brother-in-law had died in a car accident. Overcome with guilt and accusations, Luciano's drug use spiraled further, and he began trafficking.

Threats against his life soon followed, and he thought about disappearing completely. But his girlfriend—now his wife—challenged him to face his problems rather than run away.

In despair, Luciano shut himself inside his home until a friend invited him to The Universal Church. From his very first service, he felt a transformation begin.

"I stopped using drugs and cut myself off from that old life. I began to understand God, and He helped me reintegrate into society. It wasn't easy, but I started to truly live, because until then, I had only known theft and drugs," he shares.

During this journey, Luciano returned to school, found stable work, and secured a place to live. After three years of spiritual growth and restoration, he discovered his greatest treasure: the Holy Spirit.

"Before, we had no place to live. Now we have a home, a car, and a family restored by God's mercy. I've been freed from my addictions and the burdens of my past. But beyond all the material blessings, my greatest treasure is the Holy Spirit, and my strongest testimony is my faith," he concludes.



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In a life filled with struggles, Luciano Soares turned to crime and drugs.

But through the power of God's message, he found a brighter path forward.

"Today, we have a home, a car, and a family restored by God's mercy. I have been freed from my addictions, the burdens of my past, and feelings of rejection."

Alongside his family, Luciano once searched for scraps of food in the trash. At school, he faced constant discrimination.

Luciano, a 49-year-old welder, endured great suffering from childhood alongside his parents and seven siblings, mainly due to poverty. "We lived near a dump, where we collected materials for recycling and searched for scraps of food to eat," he explains.

He recalls being bullied at school, which left him with deep feelings of inferiority and isolation. Adding to his pain was the absence of his father, forcing him to rely solely on his mother for comfort. But tragedy struck when the dump that sustained their survival was shut down. With no hope left, his mother turned to alcohol and soon passed away from a stroke. "I lost my family overnight. With her death, each sibling went their own way, and my father started another family just two weeks later. I was left alone at 16."

Without his mother's presence, Luciano felt completely lost. After moving in with his sister, he was drawn into a dark path with his brother-in-law—stealing cars and using drugs.

"I tried every kind of drug. I started with alcohol and mushroom tea, then moved to



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
